

I sent to you on April 11, a copy of the letter that I had written to the Premier about the draft aide memoire and the memorandum of comments on certain of the technical clauses of the proposed treaty about the Surinam boundary. Doubtless because of recent unhappy events here and the general strike that still afflicts the country, I have had no reply from the Premier; but I copied my letter also to the Solicitor General (Mr. M. Shahabuddeen) and I send with this, for your information and possible action, a copy of his letter to me of April 19.

. 2. You will see that Mr. Shahabuddeen starts with the speculation whether it might not be the better thing to hold on to the New River triangle and make a strong claim to navigation rights. But, as he mya, we should be guided by the Foreign Office about the hope of securing a return to the British draft. On the last page of his letter the Solicitor General refers to an interesting feature of the "Kaart van Suriname door H.N. Dahlberg (M.O. Aardijkskunde)" on the scale of 1; 1,000,000. (undoff) On this, a triangle in the south-west, between the "Nieuwe Rivier" and the "Coroni Rivier", and a triangle in the south-east, between the "Litani Rivier" and the "Merowini "ivier", are both shaded the same but in a shading found nowhere else on the map and not explained in the legend. Both are marked "Betwist Gebied", which I guess (but can not at the moment verify) means "A betwixtand-between district"? (I may be wildly out.) It would be worth checking to see what the Dutch (Surinamers) are up to about the Litani transpace.

3. er. Shahabuddeen then turns to some interesting points on the technical matters:

- (a) He makes what seems a good case to me for omitting the words "in international practice" from the paragraph about the thalweg.
- (b) he records that our Lands and Mines Department claim that the Jorentyne is navigable beyond Tropic Isle probably right up to Wonotobo (or Governor Light's) Falls, but certainly as far as Cow Falls.

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(c) On page 3 he suggests that the median line method of dividing territorial waters would seem to result in a boundary more favourable to us than the one proposed by the Dutch.

4. Er. Shahabuddeen also draws attention to a point that I had failed to notice on the copy of the aide memore sent here - there are only three paragraphs but the last is numbered "4". This was presumably a typing error? We have a complete copy? We have a complete copy?
